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## Editorial Note

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The essays in this, the fourth volume of the *Undergraduate Transitional Justice Review*, are a collection of works that query fundamental questions associated with the study of Transitional Justice: Could justice in another form represent a real “justice” for victims of indignity? What will it take for those who have suffered to “feel” that justice has been done? Hunsberger’s article provides insights into these and other questions.

In the other four essays, the authors explore these questions with regard to groups of people who have been targeted through nothing they, themselves, have done. Rather, the abuses suffered by Guatemalans, Aboriginal Canadians, and black people living in Nazi Germany were in many ways arbitrary. But at their heart they had to do with basic dehumanization and denial of the humanity of others. These cases are instructive, as are the lessons that reveal “how not” to deal with these sorts of legacies.
