THE HURRICANE OF MONDAY.

From several districts we have accounts of serious damage done to property by the hurricane of Monday. In BROCKVILLE, says the MONITOR, it suddenly became intensely dark, while the rain poured down in a perfect torrent, and the wind blew with tremendous force. The roof of a building on MAIN STREET, occupied by MR. PATRICK MULLANEY, was lifted bodily from the walls and landed in the roadway beneath after a flight of some forty feet. A frame building was also blown over on one of the back streets, and the gable of MR. JOHN STEACY'S handsome brick cottage, occupied by MR. GEORGE TURNER, blown in. Considerable damage was otherwise done by the tornado in the town. While the storm was at its height a waterspout formed in the river, close by the wharves, and the dense columns of black cloud it produced made the scene tenfold more dismal.

In the TOWNSHIP of WILLIAMSBURG, DUNDAS, the barns were blown down; and the LONDON PROTOTYPE, says of the passage over that city Sign-boards, posts, chimneys, fences, and the like, suffered severely. In one instance, a falling chimney, on the top of one of the stores on RICHMOND STREET, fell through the roof, doing considerable damage inside. The fence in front of the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH was also severely handled; a fine ornamental tree in front of the Church falling on the fence and knocking it endways. The most astonishing freak of all, was at the post-office, where one of the large panes 3x4 feet, was actually blown into the room in one piece. On falling, it entered the floor near where one of the clerks was standing, penetrating the wood for about an inch, but fortunately hurting no one.
