MONTHLY WEATHER REVIEW.

JUNE 1882.

STORM DATE .SUNDAY JUNE 18TH. 1882 at about 4PM.

On the 17th. an area of low pressure was forming over the North-West states, and the next morning, as the depression started Eastward, all stations on the GEORGIAN BAY and LAKE HURON were warned to expect a moderate gale from the East, winds to shift round by South; and at the same time all LAKE ERIE and ONTARIO stations were warned to expect a moderate gale from the Eastward. During the 18th. the depression moved Eastward across the LAKES, and during the afternoon and night of that day and morning of the next a strong gale prevailed on GEORGIAN BAY, the highest winds coming with a thunderstorm and were apparently not of long duration, being mostly from the South-East by South to North-West. Our agent at PRESQU'ISLE reports a fearful gale, he says "A most destructive cyclone passed over this section of country on Sunday, 18th. about 4pm., accompanied by thunder and lightning and rain. The actual width of the cyclone extended about 200 yards, but there was a heavy gale outside of it for some miles, increasing in force on each side towards the cyclone. Not a building, tree, fence or even stump in the fields withstood the force, everything levelled to the ground. I have report of 17 houses, barns and stables down within 6 miles of here. It came in the direction of SAUGEEN to here and must have done great damage South-West of my information. Fortunately, it passed into the Bay half a mile South of this village" "Several horses and cattle are reported killed by falling trees and buildings." The velocity of the wind was estimated at 75mph. as the wind twisted the anemometer out of shape. Our KINCARDINE agent reports from 4 30pm. to 5 30pm. on 18th. a very severe thunderstorm with very high wind: "The wind was much more severe a few miles East of this station, unroofing some barns and destroying fruit trees." KINCARDINE is to the South-South-West of PRESQU'ISLE about 55 miles.
