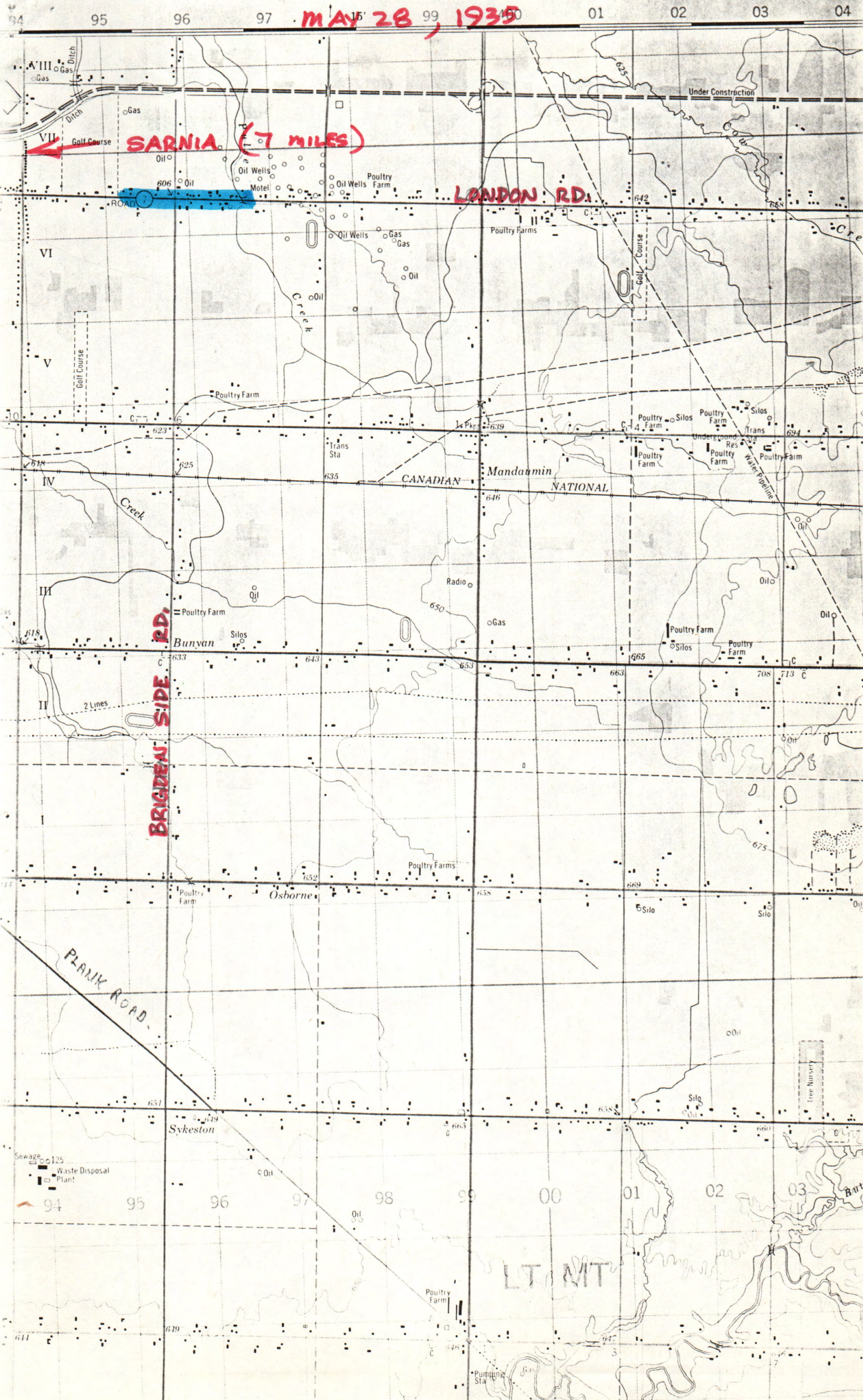

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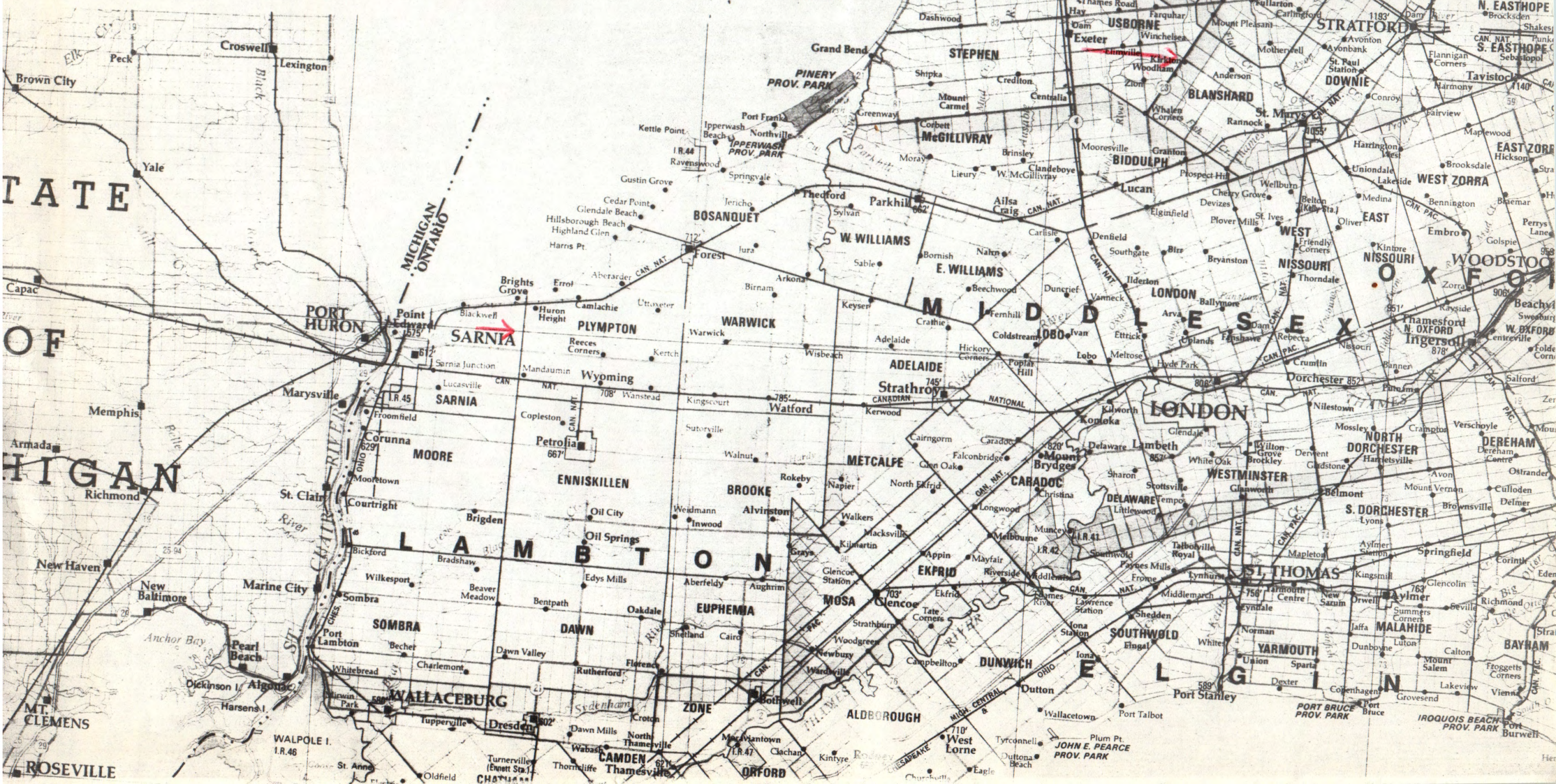

CYCLONE SWEEPS 6TH. LINE OF PEEL. ("STORM AT SARNIA")also)

Old man weather turned on the tap on Monday night and Tuesday and indications are that he has effectively banished the predicted drought, in this district at any rate. The showers developed into a steady rain that soaked the soil thoroughly and provided the much needed moisture to bring along the crops that are "showing up well" and now farmers and gardeners are wearing a smile.

The rain Tuesday night was accompanied by a high wind which did considerable damage to some property in the district. Just before going to press we learn that the storm on the 6TH. of PEEL developed into a cyclone which completely demolished the barn on MR. JAMES MORRIS' farm and also badly damaged his house. MR. ED. MORRIS' barn and house and MR. THOMAS HOWLETT'S strawshed and buildings on MR. JOSEPH TURNER'S farm were also badly damaged. The cyclone started about 6.30 and swept buildings, trees, fences and almost everything in its way. The MORRIS brothers, who suffered the greatest loss, carried Wind Insurance on their buildings.

The trees in MR. WILLIAM WATSON'S orchard were also uprooted and much damage was done to his property.

In the SARNIA district at least a dozen barns were razed, roofs blown off houses, highways strewn with trees, telephone poles and wire for a stretch of one mile along SARNIA-LONDON highway. Several people are reported injured according to dispatches in Wednesday's daily papers.

# Two-Minute Twister Tosses Tree Over Home

## Raging Storm Near Elora — Poplars, as Wind-break, Save Farm Residence

Elora, May 29.—Damage amounting to thousands of dollars was left in the path of a terrific windstorm which raged cyclonic velocity in Peel Township, twelve miles west of here.

One barn was totally destroyed, others had the roofs blown off, huge trees and orchards were uprooted and blocked at least one of the main roads of the district. Telephone poles and wires for almost half a mile were down, while pieces of the wreckage of the damaged buildings were found high in trees a half mile away.

The twister, which struck a small patch of the township less than a mile square and which took less than two minutes to work its havoc, struck its heaviest blow along the Sixth Concession. A large barn owned by James Morris was razed to the ground when the wind demon twisted it and scattered its members over a wide area. A large field surrounding the barn was literally covered with boards and shingles. One huge timber was blown over the top of the Morris residence, three hundred feet away, carrying away the chimney in its flight yet leaving the occupants of the house uninjured. Debris broke every window in one side of the building. The barn had been of sturdy construction, but it crumbled as though matchwood under the terrific force of the tornado. Implements and crops also added into the total of property damage.

On the adjoining farm, owned by Edward C. Morris, the roof and a part of the barn was blown down. Pieces of metal sheeting from this building were driven into the trunk of a tree at least a third of a mile away. On the farm of William Watson, in the same locality, a large number of trees in the orchard were uprooted, as well as a long row of poplars which saved this house from almost certain destruction.

# Sarnia Area Hit by Storm

## Several Barns Razed, Roofs Lifted and Trees Strew Highway

Sarnia, May 28 (CP). **A**T LEAST a dozen barns were razed, roofs blown off houses, and highway strewn with trees, telephone poles and wire for a stretch of one mile along Sarnia-London Highway, eight miles east of Sarnia, in a windstorm early tonight. Several people are reported injured. Trains and communications are badly disrupted.

Christian Purvis, 28, daughter of Robert Purvis, farmer, is in hospital with severe cuts on her legs and body bruises. Eva Park, 20, daughter of John Park, is also in hospital with a badly bruised arm and cuts about her body.

The storm, which broke about 4.30 p'clock this afternoon, passed over the city without doing any damage. Worst damage was done in a narrow strip on each side of the Provincial highway.

Tonight several families were housed by kindly neighbors, as their own dwellings were without roofs. Shingles were torn off the roofs of many homes. Barns were smashed, and nearly every orchard in the area uprooted.

Tonight emergency gangs, Hydro and telephone linesmen, police and volunteers, were at work clearing the debris from the road and endeavoring to restore communication.

The windstorm came immediately before a violent thunder and rain storm that was not of exceptional violence as it passed over Sarnia, and no damage of note was done in the city or intervening area between here and the London Road Church, seven miles east. In the vicinity of the Bridgen side road, for a distance of one mile and closely confined to the farms adjoining the highway, the wind cut a swath that brought buildings and trees to the ground and spread terror among the residents.

People over a radius of twenty miles saw the dark pathway of the twister as it swept along the highway. Miss J. Park was swept out of her home with the door and carried over a wire fence into a field. Her father's car was blown clean out of the garage, while the garage itself remained on its foundation.
