

TORNADO CUTS 100-YARD SWATH THROUGH GALT.

GALT. AUG.1. A tornado, lasting five minutes and preceding an electric storm, cut a 100-yard swath across this city late Saturday afternoon, causing thousands of dollars damage. It came from the west and resembled a smoke.

The biggest loss was the destruction of a barn on the farm of MRS.H.HORTON, just outside the city limits, and with it more than \$6,000 worth of paraphernalia used in the annual Santa Claus parade. There was no insurance on building or its contents.

Hydro, telephone and telegraph wires were broken by falling trees.

TV aerials were turned into fantastic shapes, chimneys were blown off
houses, windows smashed and a dozen or more houses were damaged when trees
fell on the roofs.

On the east side of the city the framework of a new house was moved 10 feet off its foundation and a garage was lifted into the air, but the car it housed escaped without a scratch. On <u>WATER STREET SOUTH</u> a big window of a <u>PRINTING PLANT</u> was blown out and a woman passing at the time threw herself into the gutter to escape the flying glass, One house on the east side had its roof pierced in two places.

The sawdust collector and piping on top of a <u>DOOR FACTORY</u> were compressed into the shape of an accordion.

Linemen and city employees worked late into the night on a cleanup job and were back at it this morning.

PRESTON. to the north, was also hit hard, and at <u>PUSLINCH LAKE</u> the roof was lifted off a summer cottage. West of <u>GALT</u> a farm-shed and silo were destroyed.
