STORM DATE. ABOUT 3 P.M., SUN. JULY 8TH. 1956.

AREA CLEANING UP AFTER VIOLENT TWISTER, ESTIMATE DAMAGE TO RUN INTO THOUSANDS.. BARNs FLATTENED, TREES UPROOTED IN LISTOWEL, ATWOOD DISTRICTS.

The work of repairing, patching and building was still going on at mid-week and will continue for several weeks in LISTOWEL, ATWOOD and surrounding areas following Sunday's violent twister which ripped through the area leaving a path of devastation and damage running into thousands of dollars. The tornado-like winds struck the area around 3 o'clock and within minutes had flattened barns, ripped off roofs, uprooted trees, torn out power lines and made travel on many roads impossible.

CAME FROM WEST.

Accompanied by a midnight blackness with rain and lightning the high winds roared in from the west, hitting the ETHEL, ATWOOD area, moving on to LISTOWEL and continuing through WALLACE. Luckily, there were no serious injuries although the work of cleaning up will not be completed for many weeks.

Hydro power was disrupted for six hours as well as telephone service in many sections where wires were ripped down by falling trees. A heavy downpour of rain increased the damage to buildings whose roofs were torn off.

Emergency crews of workmen from the P.U.C. and Hydro-Electric Power Commission were rushed in to action to restore service.

DAMAGE EXTENSIVE.

Damage to farms in ELMA TOWNSHIP was extensive. Among the worst hit were GERALD MATHESON, CON. 8, 2½ miles from ATWOOD whose barn was smashed to the ground. MR. MATHESON was not at home at the time and did not return until late Sunday night, and that of KENNETH LAIDLAW, a neighbor, who had the roof ripped off his straw shed. The shed's base shifted three feet and three rafters were carried 100 feet through the house top.

MERVYN CONEYBEARE of the 4TH. CON. had his barn roof torn off. At least two other barns on the 6TH. CON. had their roofs removed and one barn was down in this section.

FEED MILL HIT.

The roof and top storey of the back section of FISHER'S FEED MILL at LISTOWEL was destroyed, leaving large quantities of feed and seed exposed to the elements. Later, while cleaning up the debris, a roof timber crashed through the top floor, coming to rest in the mixing room on the ground floor.

JIM ADAMS, R.R. 3 LISTOWEL, said he saw the funnel-shaped wind approaching. Standing in the doorway of his parents' home, he narrowly missed being struck in the face with flying debris when the barn 50 feet away was shattered. This large barn, on the farm of ALBERT ADAMS, 1 1/4 miles north of LISTOWEL, was destroyed with the exception of the stone stable underneath.

LIVESTOCK INJURED.

Five pigs and 200 chickens housed in the stable section were uninjured.

The roof was blown from the J.A. McCracken farm north of LISTOWEL, while on the 8TH. CON. at least two other barns were reported destroyed.

In LISTOWEL the furniture and interior of an upstairs apartment occupied by MR. and MRS. HARRY FORMAN, were damaged when the metal sheeting was torn from the flat roof.

A garage on ELMA STREET, owned by RUSS McCUTCHEON, and one on the corner of ELMA and VICTORIA STREETS, owned by MRS. RICHARD OKE were destroyed. A large tree was thrown onto the roof of a house occupied by BUD BITTON.

Throughout the town of LISTOWEL streets and lawns were littered with debris.

ATWOOD HIT.

The roof was blown off one of the barns struck by the wind at ROE FARMS. At another ROE barn, the roof was removed by the wind, and many of the siding boards were removed. Both of the damaged ROE barns were on the 6TH. CON. ELMA. At one of the ROE properties, trees were uprooted in an orchard, and limbs were torn off fruit trees.

On the 8TH. CON. ELMA a school adjoining the farm of ALEX MATHESON suffered damage, with the shingles blown off one side of the roof. The school is in a union school section, ELMA and GREY.

TOMBSTONES TOPPLE.

At a cemetery on the 8TH. CON., east of the KENNETH LAIDLAW farm, tombstones were turned over, and limbs were blown from trees in the cemetery.

WELDON NICHOL'S garage on the 4TH. CON. of ELMA, was levelled by the storm, and the barn doors were removed by the wind. There were also holes in the roof and sides of the barn, after the twister had passed across the NICHOL farms; a threshing machine on the barn floor was moved about three feet.

There was nobody home at the time of
the tornado. The Coneybears turned off
highway 23 to go to their farm but
a tree across the 4th Con. blocked
their way.

Heavy bridge over a creek behind
the barn constructed of heavy elm planks
was destroyed. The planks were carried
20 rods to the west.

A tree branch went through a window
in the house. The glass broke into very
small pieces which were driven into the
ceiling plaster, and walls. When wall-
papering the room recently they found
glass still embedded in the plaster.

Thirty gallon milk cans filled with
whey were scattered all over, and
filled with chaff.

(519) 291-1592, NE corner, N of Listowel.
MR ADAMS has the Tweedown history
book with photos of tornado damage
of July 8 1956.

MR Adams said he saw the
short grass on the McCracken farm being
rolled flat as the tornado approached.

The barn on the Adams farm was destroyed.
MR Adams said the walls fell outward.
The west wall was carried westward
towards Highway 23.

The tornado was accompanied
by a loud roar.

TORNADO LOSS HEAVY IN BRUCE, PERTH COUNTIES.

PAISLEY, JULY 8. A tornado that swept through this BRUCE COUNTY area tonight and high winds that battered the surrounding district left a trail of about \$250,000 in damage in the PAISLEY, LISTOWEL, ATWOOD and DUBLIN areas.

The tornado here wrecked at least ten barns, damaged several others, uprooted trees and disrupted hydro and telephone service. Damage at the PAISLEY BRICK and TILE COMPANY was estimated at \$30,000.

At ATWOOD, in PERTH COUNTY, WILBERT HEWITT was pinned for five minutes between two shattered doors of his farmhouse with a baby in his arms.

He said he heard a roar of wind and grabbed his ten-month-old son VERNON just as the dining room door crashed down. His wife had taken refuge in a clothes closet. HEWITT'S barn was destroyed.

Near DUBLIN, a large frame barn on the farm of THOMAS DORSEY, on No. 8 HIGHWAY, was smashed from its concrete foundation but pigs and calves in the lower part of the barn were unharmed. A pumphouse and garage also went down during the storm.

Across the road part of the roof was blown off a house owned by JAMES J. KRAUSKOPF. Windows were broken and a steel roof lifted off a driving shed. A colony house disappeared.

Tree-blocked roads caused detours in many areas. In order to go to his home near PAISLEY from KINCARDINE, 22 miles away, WILMER McFADDEN of GREENOCK TOWNSHIP, had to travel 50 miles.
