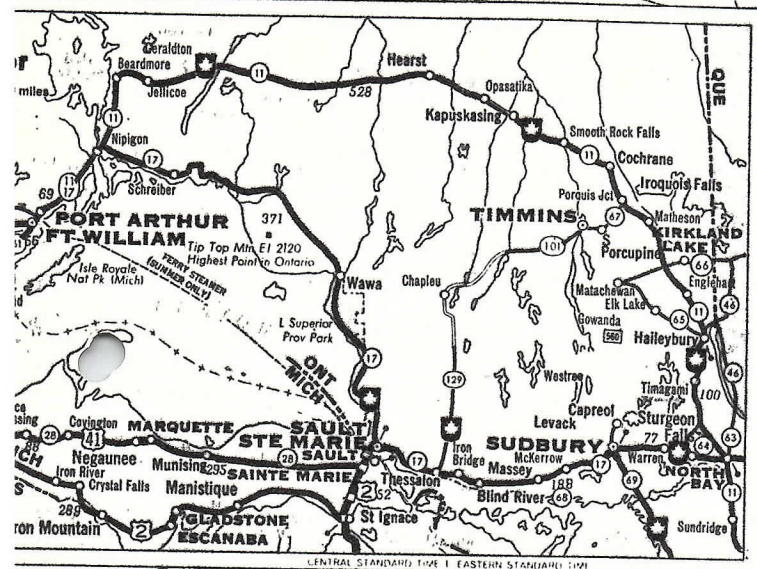
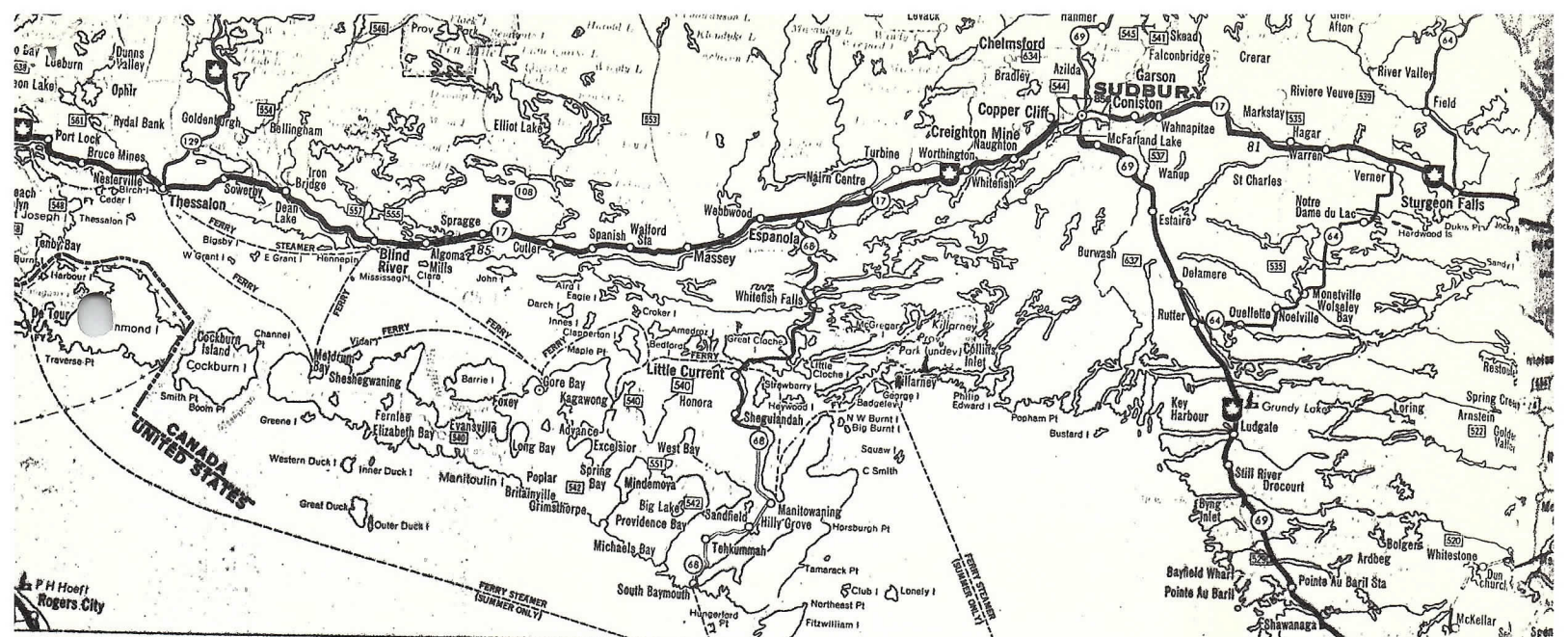

STORM DATE. 4:15 P.M., MON. JUNE 7TH, 1971.

Hydro crews worked throughout Monday night well into Tuesday to restore power and repair lines tangled and broken as a result of the severe storm which hit this area shortly after 6p.m. Although property damage was extensive in some districts, no personal injury was reported.

According to ROY GALWAY, of the local office of Ontario Hydro, ELMA TOWNSHIP was the hardest hit, with sections of MORNINGTON, LOGAN and WALLACE TOWNSHIPS also taking a beating. Numerous telephone calls reporting damage were received throughout Monday night at the Hydro office.

Weather reports gave wind velocities of up to 62m.p.h., but many people, especially those living in areas of ELMA and GREY TOWNSHIPS, believe this to be a conservative estimate since demolished barns and uprooted trees in the direct path of the storm indicated that perhaps a tornado struck the district.

Worst hit in the ELMA, GREY area, were the properties of ELSTON SPEIRAN, KENNETH LOVE and HARVEY GODBOLT, all located on the 10TH. CON. WEST of highway 23.

MR. SPEIRAN, son of WILLIAM SPEIRAN of town, estimates his loss at \$50,000. A large frame barn, built in 1895 by Elston's grandfather, Hartwell Speiran, was completely demolished as was a small shed. In the path of the flying debris, the SPEIRAN home had all the windows on the north side broken, resulting in some water damage.

A pole rafter from the barn ended up lodged in a tree 25 feet above the ground and a pointed board was driven like a spear into the kitchen eave. Straw was driven into the siding of the house; 15 feet of cement slabbing was torn off a silo and a limb from a tree fell on the SPEIRAN truck, damaging its hood.

Kenneth LOVE'S 2-year-old barn was damaged and his modern home of the same age was extensively damaged, losing half of its roof and receiving considerable water damage. Metal sheeting from the barn crashed into the house, felling an entrance way. A piece of lumber from the barn was driven through the side of the house into the main bedroom. A small number of pigs, calves and a few hens survived the storm.

MRS. LOVE, who had her grandson Kenneth Foster, 2½, with her, said she was terrified when the wind started and went to the basement. MR. SPEIRAN said he took his family to the basement when he saw the barn roof move up and down.



Out at the farm of HARVEY GODBOLT, on the 10TH.CON., just inside the GREY boundary, winds demolished a shed, tore off the barn roof, damaged a metal, glass lined silo, drove metal sheeting and other debris into the vinyl siding of a new room on the house, damaged the farm truck, and considerably damaged the roof of the house, knocking down the chimney and television aerial.

All along the 10TH.CON. damage was heavy. A small bush looked as though it had been shelled and MR. GALWAY noted that a three phase power line, west of NEWRY, was completely ripped off.

Other properties damaged along the line were: a farm shed demolished on the farm of H. JACKSON; extensive damage to the home of GLEN BUCHANAN & SONS; a roof off a shed at T.W. DEWAR'S farm; extensive damage to trees and a car badly damaged at DAVID DEWAR'S property; a line of 50-foot high evergreens on the property of ALVIN SHIELL were bowled over like ten pins with one resting on the roof of the house; WILLIAM LONG'S poultry barn had its end blown out; the roof is off part of JACK SANDER'S barn, ALVIN MATHESON'S barn and the barn of WILLIAM NICHOL & SON.

#### ATWOOD DAMAGE.

In the village of ATWOOD high winds damaged dozens of trees with ELLEN STREET being the hardest hit. There, a big maple tree split, coming down on the property of JOHN VAN SICKLE, narrowly missing his car. The top of a large spruce tree on the VAN SICKLE property toppled on the kitchen roof of the ERNEST ROGER home. MRS. ROY HAMILTON'S house lost its chimney, and a tool shed in the area was carried 40 feet by the wind.

Out in the MONKTON area, the barn on the farm of ADAM WEIDERMAN. located on the 17TH.CON., was demolished, as was a large metal-sided driving shed on the farm of JOHN SAVAGE to the east.

On the farm of RUSSEL PESTILL a partially filled 250-gallon gas tank was blown 10 feet in the air before landing on the top of a children's playhouse which was wrecked.

West of the highway, on the 17TH.CON., there was damage to the WALLACE BAILLIE property and MR. and MRS. MILTON OPPENHAUSER, had their verandah demolished. A top was blown off the silo on the farm of ELWOOD SEILI, just west of MONKTON.

CONCESSION of GREY was demolished during the big storm Monday.

The ~~sil~~ metal silo suffered at least \$2,000 damage.(Banner Photo)
