I am interested in how contemporary practitioners are reimagining the generic tenets of the documentary medium to examine these subliminal terrains. My project seeks to employ curatorial approaches as methodological tools for research and pedagogy, which will foster inclusive community participation involving art practitioners, writers, curators, archivists, and scholars in the field.
