# 3,1984 understorm sweeps over Eastern Ont.

The storm that swept through the area Wednesday afternoon brought Brinston resident Urcyl Wickwire his first tornado and he hopes it's his last.

A dark funnel-shaped twister touched down in his yard about 5 p.m., uprooting dozens of trees and destroying three outbuildings around his rural home about 70 kilometres southeast of Ottawa.

"Every building is down except the house," Wickwire said early today from his home at RR 2 Brinston, about 10 km north of Ir oquois.

His property was the hardest hit in the area as the thunderstorm passed through Eastern Ontario.

Police in Morrisburg said the only other reported damage in their area was a porch blown down about 10 km east of the Wickwire residence.

About 12 millimetres of rain fell in the Ottawa area in 45 minutes, temporarily flooding a few streets.

Strong winds and lightning also caused power blackouts at 3 p.m. in the Leitrim area of Gloucester, where about 24 hydro customers were left without power for about

Wickwire said he was looking out the window of his home with his 15-year-old son when they saw a large funnel-shaped cloud heading toward the house.
"I thought it was a hurricane

and told my son to go down to the basement.

Wickwire never had time to join his son as the twister touched down on his property with a vengence and left just as suddenly, leaving the yard littered with uprooted trees and debris from the remains of three small buildings on his property.

He estimated damage to his property at \$10,000.
