STORM DATE. EVE. WED. JULY 11TH. ? 1860.

The AYR OBSERVER states that on Wednesday evening a violent storm of wind and rain passed over a portion of SOUTH DUMFRIES. The roof was blown off the barn of MR. GEORGE CHITTENDEN—several rafters of the building were carried about thirty rods distant, strips of lumber and shingles were picked up after the storm, on the farm of MR. MONTGOMERY about a half a mile from MR. CHITTENDEN'S. A portion of fence, about ten rods, was lifted up and blown into the middle of the field which it enclosed. The storm was also very severe at DRUMBO, uprooting trees, etc.
