TERRIFIC STORM.

OBSERVER account)

One of the most terrible storms we remember to have experienced, occurred on Sunday night last. During the day the weather was oppressively warm; and at night about 9 o'clock forked lightning began to play in the west. About 9 30pm., the flashes of lightning having in the meantime become exceedingly vivid and rapid, and a distant rolling of thunder prevailing like the roll of muffled drums, the storm broke over the town. Hailstones of enormous size, almost instantly covered the ground, breaking in windows, some times driving through panes of glass in the same way that a bullet might be supposed to do, and shaking the buildings to their very foundations. A strong wind prevailed at the time and the scene for 10 minutes, during which the storm in its fury lasted, was beyond description. The hail was pure clear ice in large pieces, and generally of oblong shapes. The next morning large quantities of it could be found upon the ground. The damage done by the storm can hardly be estimated. Scarcely a house in its line escaped without some windows broken. The gardens suffered terribly. Vines and plants of different kinds were cut to pieces, and many gardens presented an appearance as if a man had gone in with a heavy raw-hide and slashed about him in all directions. Fruit trees suffered too, the unripe being shaken off. One building in course of erection by Mr. WEBBER, had the roof blown off. The building for the vestry and SABBATH SCHOOL of the BIBLE CHRISTIAN CHURCH, nearly finished, was blown down. Indeed almost every one within the influence of the storm has a tale to tell of the injury it inflicted upon him. The weather has been cool ever since. PETERBORO' REVIEW.

HAIL STORM AT LINDSAY. (FROM THE LINDSAY ADVOCATE.)

LINDSAY and the neighbourhood was visited, on the night of Sunday last, by a heavy fall of hail, accompanied by a strong wind, which, we are informed, did considerable damage to the crops, and, in a few instances, to the buildings. A farmer told us that two barns, one belonging to MR. WILLIAM BLACKWELL, and the other to MR. JOHN HUSSEY, both of QPS, were blown down, and about forty rods of his own fence "skedaddled" through the air at a great rate; some of the rails must have been blown to a great distance, as not much more than half of them could be found. The hail, which in some parts continued as long as fifteen minutes, was followed by a tremendous fall of rain. The rain, however, was much needed, and will prove a great help to the thirsty crops. While the storm was brewing, as well as during its continuance, the lightning was vivid, and we hear that a colt belonging to a farmer named HUTTON, was struck and killed. LINDSAY ADVOCATE.
