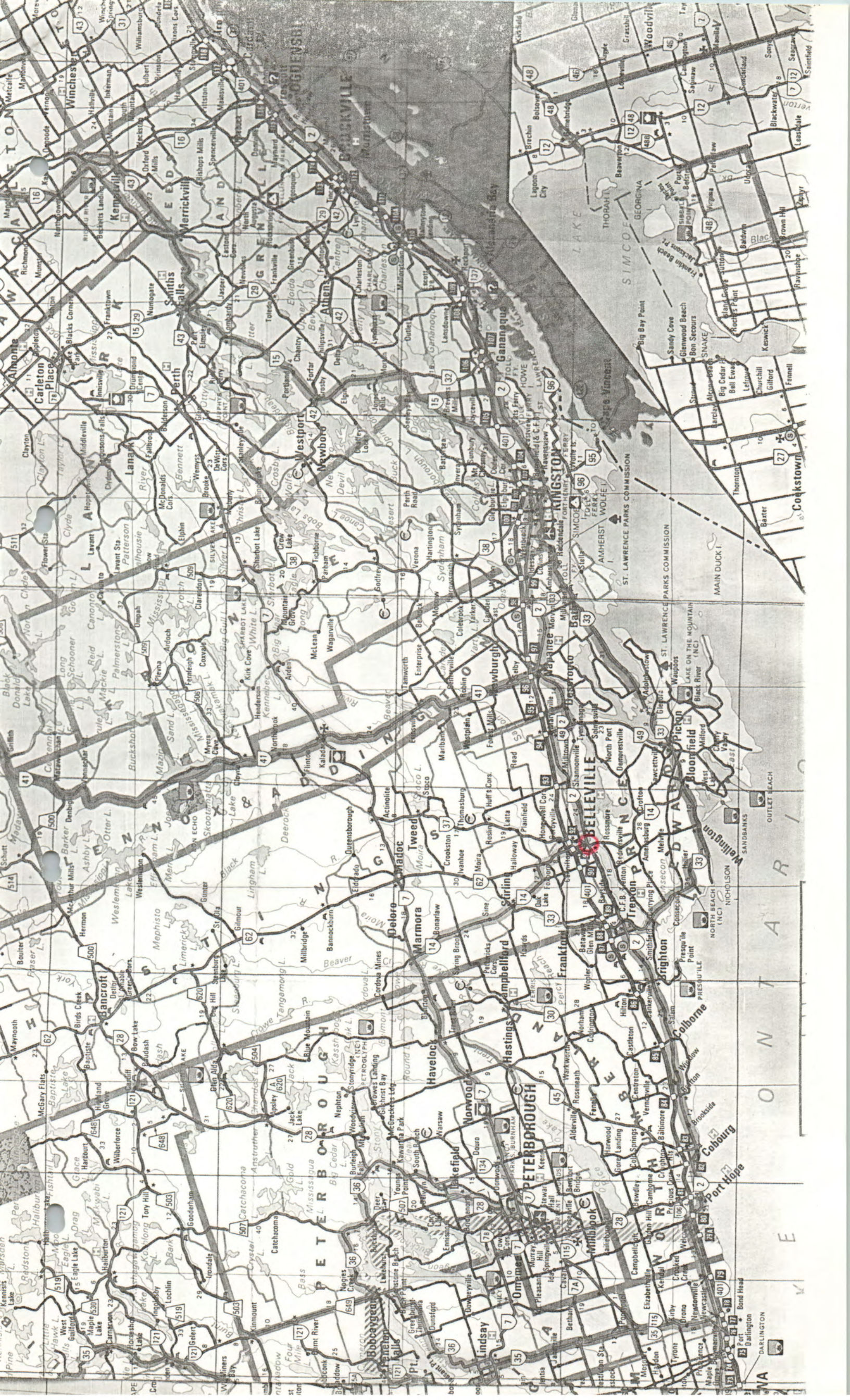

VIOLENT STORM.

One of the most violent storms we ever witnessed, passed over this town on Wednesday evening, the 8th. inst. The wind blew a perfect hurricane, levelling fences, prostrating crops, and blowing down trees in every direction. The wind storm lasted about ten or fifteen minutes, and was succeeded by a heavy thunder shower. A large quantity of rain fell, which will do a great deal of good to the growing crops.
