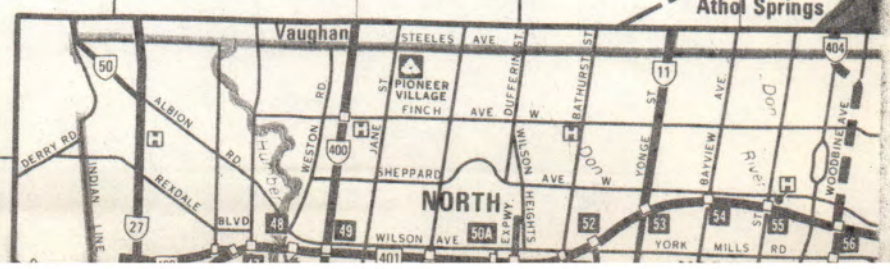

TERRIBLE STORM.

HAMILTON, JULY 2ND. The storm of yesterday afternoon was one of the most disastrous which has visited this city for a long time. A great many shade trees were either uprooted or broken off. The roofs of some houses were lifted, and one of the turrets of MACNAB STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH was blown down, passing through the roof and doing great damage to the ceiling and gallery. The mass of stone weighed fully half a ton.

STORM DATE. AFTERNOON, MON. JULY 1ST. 1872.

The particulars of the tornado in the vicinity of PRESOTT are thus given by the CANADIAN TRIBUNE. "We have the particulars of the tornado which occurred in this vicinity on Monday afternoon last. It was most terrific in the TOWNSHIP of AUGUSTA, where not only fences and trees were blown down, but houses and barns were destroyed. MR. JOHN HANNAH had the roof blown off his stone house, and the windows broken, and his two barns and a woodshed were blown down and completely demolished. A new cylinder threshing machine in one of the barns was totally destroyed by being blown for over a distance of 50 feet.
