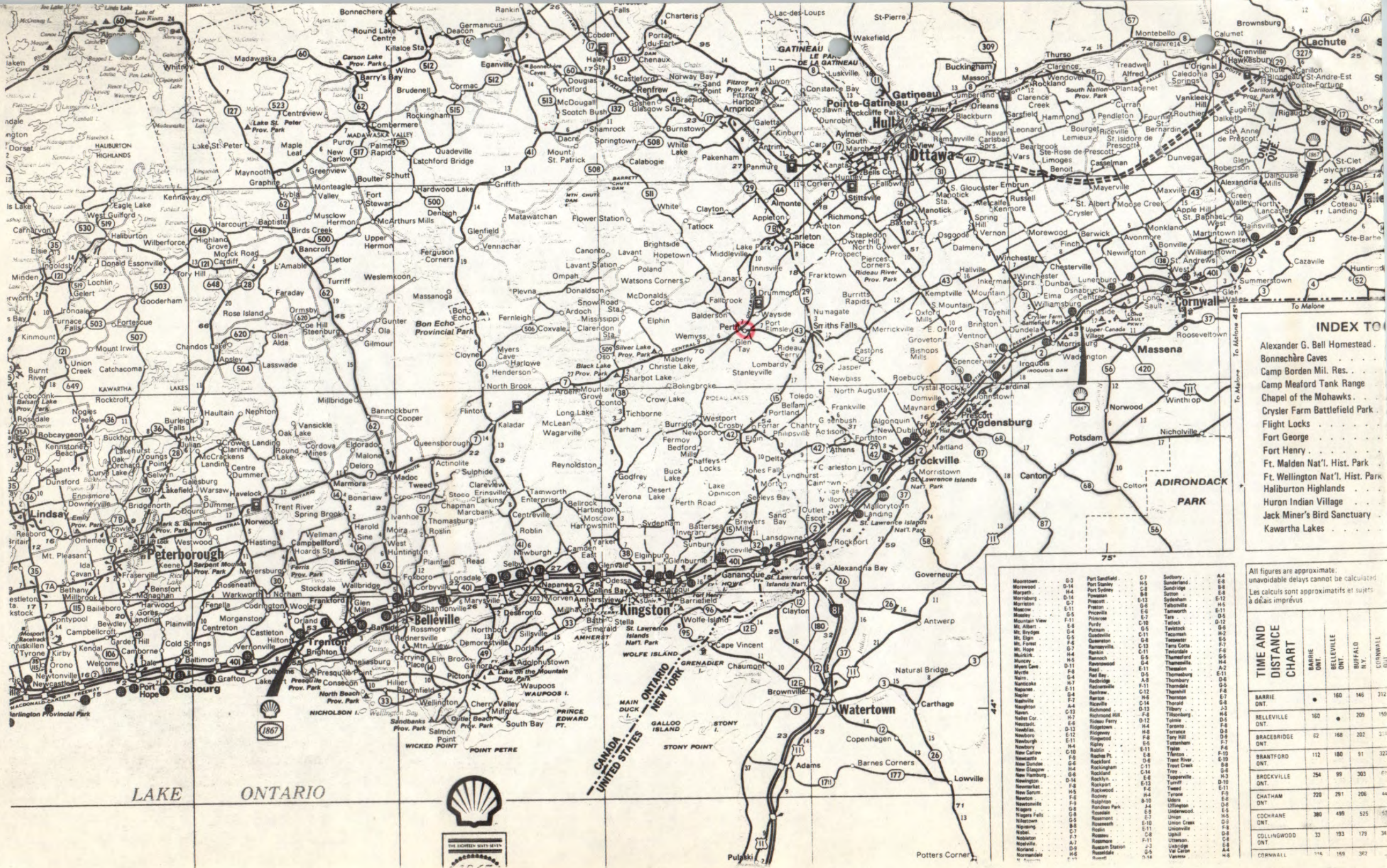

Miniature Cyclone.

A miniature cyclone passed through the Drummond farming district near Perth, on Friday morning. Several windmills were blown down, trees were uprooted and several sheds destroyed. Windows in farm houses were blown in. As most of the crop in this section has already been garnered, little loss was experienced by the farmers.

Stationed Here in 1883.

A Heavy Rain Storm.

Kingston had an all-day rain on Sunday, and it was a "soaker" too. The majority of citizens spent the day indoors, as a result, and the wet weather was responsible for a slim attendance at some of the church services. Quite a number of cellars were flooded. The weather was quite cool and in a few cases furnaces were given their first workout of the season.

RAINFALL WELCOME AFTER DRY AUGUST

Last Month Was the Driest
in These Parts in Past 25
Years.

Heavy rains of last night, yesterday noon, and on Thursday have been just what was needed, according to Mr. E. S. Hopkins, in charge of field husbandry at the Dominion Experimental Farm. Mr. Hopkins pointed out that August was the driest month locally for the last twenty-five years, according to the records, so that new grass seedings were rather in need of rain. Mr. Hopkins said also that fall plowing can be much better done now on account of the rains.

The records of rainfall at the Experimental Farm during the past three days have been as follows: .58 of an inch of rain in the early morning storm which broke over the city and district between 3 and 4 a.m. today; .72 of an inch of rain in the heavy fall on Friday noon when the city and district were swept by great gusts, to the discomfort of noonday lunchers; and .30 of an inch of rain on Thursday, making a total of 1.60 inches during the three days.

No Damage Reported.

No damage has been reported to phone systems or electric wires by any of the local companies as a result of the early morning storm which disturbed the slumbers of most residents of Ottawa and its environs on account of the heavy thunderclaps. The lightning was pretty vivid and the countryside was strangely illumined by the repeated flashes which followed each other in quick succession almost like the signals of a huge wireless apparatus.

The Bell Telephone Company suffered more from the storm of yesterday, it was officially reported, as the exceptionally heavy rain and electric storm put over 200 local phones out of commission.

The atmosphere this morning is rather sweeter and cooler as a result of the early storm. Around noon the temperature was almost exactly what is known as normal, 64 degrees being registered by thermometers on Sparks street.
