BUILDINGS AND ORCHARDS DESTROYED BY CYCLONE..

MILVERTON,ONT.MAY 5.A cyclone passed over a section of the TOWNSHIP of GREY,about five miles west of MONKTON,yesterday afternoon and did considerable damage.The barn belonging to MR.DUNCAN McKAY was blown to matchwood,the flying timbers doing considerable damage to his house.His driving shed was also blown away,and his implements all wrecked,and his orchard was uprooted.The barn of MR.ANDREW MACHAN was unroofed and his house much damaged,while his orchard was entirely destroyed.The orchard of MR.RICHARD ROBINSON was also destroyed.Telephone poles and telegraph wires were blown into a tangled mass.The storm was the worst ever witnessed in the locality.

CYCLONE AND HAIL NORTHEAST OF LONDON.

LONDON,ONT.MAY 5.As the result of a small cyclone which struck parts of LONDON and WEST NISSOURI TOWNSHIPS yesterday afternoon,a number of farmers will have to reseed their land.The rain and hail,while disastrous where it was the most severe,seems to have been confined to a small area,the storm centre of which was REBECCA village,about seven miles to the northeast of the city.Hailstones over an inch long smashed windows in many houses,besides tearing up the ground,while the water washed all low land.An evidence of the cyclonic nature of the storm was brought to the city by MR.J.H.TAYLOR,a LONDON FLORIST,whose rig was lifted completely off the road,and whose horses became so terrified that they lay down on the ground,refusing to move.The rural telephone systems in the district were still out of commision today.
