DAMAGE AT NORWICH.

WOODSTOCK, JULY 6. On Saturday afternoon a terrific storm raged in OXFORD to the south of WOODSTOCK. It came up about half past two o'clock, and although WOODSTOCK was not visited, practically no rain falling, the region of NORWICH suffered from the effects of the tornado. The worst damage done was in NORWICH VILLAGE. The rain came down in torrents and was accompanied by a terrific gale.

Trees and fences were uprooted, and the main street in Norwich was blocked for a time by the debris uprooted and carried by the wind. The large plate-glass window in the office of MR. L. BUSH was blown in and shattered.

A big sign on HENDERSON'S GENERAL STORE was torn away and blown through the large twelve by fifteen foot plate-glass window in front of BISHOP'S HARDWARE STORE, and windows in houses were blown in and broken.

A large tree in FREEMAN MOORE'S pasture was blown down, injuring a cow taking shelter beneath it, and quite a number of silos in the vicinity were blown over. CHARLES FLETCHER, of NEWARK, had a valuable four-year-old cow killed by lightning and suffered the loss of a animal similarly.

The rain levelled the crops pretty well, but they will come around all right, is the opinion of the farmers.

CEMENT SILOS BLOWN DOWN.

PARIS, ONT. JULY 6. A fierce electrical storm passed over this section yesterday afternoon, accompanied by heavy rains and hail. During the progress of the storm a terrific wind sprang up that snapped off a large number of trees in the country like pipe stems. In town one was thrown across the roof of MR. W. A. SHANNON, fortunately doing little damage. So terrific was the wind that three cement silos were blown down: JOHN RANDALL'S, BRANTFORD TOWNSHIP, MR. NICHOLL'S, in BURFORD, and G. SIBBICK'S in SOUTH DUMFRIES. The grain in some parts was flattened to the ground. The rain, however, was badly needed, and will do untold good to the berry, root, and grain crops.
