Gales Cause Damage In Many Ontario Cities

A "baby cyclone" raked through the Niagara Peninsula Sunday afternoon and swung up for an eastward excursion along the northern fringe of Lake Ontario leaving a wake of wasted orchards, disrupted power lines and drenched boaters from Niagara Falls to Kingston.

Peterborough felt the full force of the storm which snapped telegraph poles and trees like matchsticks during a five-minute drive through the heart of the town. Sections of a roof on Roland Bennes' feed warehouse were torn loose and carried to the backyard of his home and a chimney was flattened on George Lacheur's residence on Reed Street. Two small garages were wrecked by falling trees. Fire Chief George Gambrell estimated the damage at several thousand dollars. Telephone communication was interrupted for more than three hours.

More spectacular manifestations

of the storm, which was accompanied at many points by rain or hail, occurred at Niagara Falls where more than 100 persons narrowly escaped drowning. Scores of fishing and other boats were swamped and only the larger vessels were able to ride out the storm.

Many men, swimming, others clinging to the sides of overturned boats, were rescued by the United States Coast Guard from Youngstown, shuttling in three cutters between shore and the storm-tossed lake.

Streets at Niagara-on-the-Lake were blocked for hours by fallen trees and other debris, and power and telephone lines were torn down. Orchard owners suffered undetermined losses in many sections of the fruit belt as the gale ripped limbs from laden trees. Hamilton, Ingersoll, St. Catharines, London and Kingston all reported damage.

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Storm Tips Four Boats

Four boats capsized off the Eastern Cap and many others were driven to the shelter of the bay yesterday when a sudden gale, accompanied by a heavy downpour of rain, briefly lashed the city.

Branches were torn from trees all over the city and at some points Hydro wires were broken and trees were blown down.

Hydro service on Ward's Island was disrupted for some time when the wires were broken by a tree which blew down on them.

The distress calls poured into the Life-Saving Station on the heels of the squall. The first mishap reported was the capsizing of a dinghy carrying W. H. Bremner of 103 Davisville Avenue and Robert Blair of 400 Nairn Avenue. Next call was to the aid of J. A. McLeary, 33 Parkview Avenue, and G. E. Bevington, 33 Russett Avenue. Robert Graham, 8 Snowden Avenue, and George Aggett, 338 Coxwell Avenue, were next to be rescued by the life-savers. Last distress call was to the rescue of Harry Melvin and Leonard Nyer of the National Yacht Club. All of the boats were towed in by Life-Saving launches.

Swirling down from the northwest, a miniature cyclone cut through the Town of Mimico Sunday morning, spent its major force at the corner of Mimico Avenue and Robert Street, crashed four trees down on top of the Robert Street Hydro wires, and whipped off across the lake, apparently without causing any damage elsewhere. Power was off in the district for some hours, and Sunday dinners delayed.

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
