

Telephone Blown To Bits

Two severe electrical wind and rain storms struck in Athol Township, Saturday shortly after 9 a.m. and again around 11 a.m. The dark clouds rolled in from the lake. Lightning struck at least two houses, while wind tore limbs off several trees.

Mrs. Archie Hicks suffered face and leg injuries when the telephone in the home suddenly exploded into a mass of pieces and the room was filled with smoke. Mrs. Hicks was knocked from a couch to the floor. A piece of the phone broke a glass pitcher across the room, blew fuses and damaged electric clocks and the TV set. Marks were left on the wall and curtains but there was no fire. Mrs. Lyall Hicks was in the kitchen at the time and noted the smoke.

Mr. Hicks was coming to the house at the time and had a close call. "I was about 15-20 feet from the big willow tree on the front lawn when the lightning struck. I was knocked down and stunned for a second. The light-ning ripped off a big limb and left a hole in the ground," he said.

A check by telephone workers later revealed that while the phone was grounded, the electrical discharge was so grat that it jumped over the fuses.

Later, Mr. Hicks discovered lightning had struck

and split an elm tree south of the road.

WINDOWS BLOWN

"Lightning came in from almost every corner of the house," said Neil Parks of East Lake, relating how a bolt struck the tenant house around nine o'clock Sat-

a bolt struck the tenant nouse around nine o'clock Saturday morning.

"It came in on the TV, hydro line, clothes line and telephone, and, amazingly enough, no one was hurt and damage was less than one would expect."

Mrs. Bill King and daughter were at home when the storm broke suddenly. Mrs. King's hearing was affected for a time but returned. They were shaken by the experience. the experience.

There was also some damage to the siding and the floor and articles in the home were knocked around.

A transformer in the vicinity was knocked out, and the effects of the electrical discharge felt in blowing of fuses and broken light bulbs in Mr. Parks', Harry Laundry's and other homes Laundry's and other homes.
