Storm Hits Area Friday Afternoon

Trees were uprooted, branches broken, and hyservice interrupted late Friday afternoon by a severe storm which passed through the area.

In general, however, this district escaped the heavy damage which resulted in other centres, especially London.

Winds which reached 75

miles an hour during the 20-minute storm uprooted a large maple tree on Centre street and sent it crashing onto the veran-
