A funnel cloud ripped through the Caledon area yesterday afternoon, causing at least \$25,000 in damage.

The cloud was spotted in the blackened sky over the Scott Mission Camp on Fireside Rd. around 12:30 p.m., an Ontario Provincial Police officer said.

"Thirty trees were damaged or uprooted," Constable Andrew Nevidomskis said. "One car was damaged by a tree falling on it."

The powerful cloud, which Nevidomskis said was too small to be called a tornado, also damaged a nearby farm when it touched down.

"It picked up a small steel galvanized silo and put it on First Line Rd. E.," he said.

The Toronto Weather Office said wind gusts of 100 kilometres (62 miles) an hour were recorded in the 40-minute thunderstorm and the area was under a severe weather warning until late yesterday evening.

Hail was also recorded in some areas, including Metro, meteorologist Bill Hepburn said.

Thunderstorms across Metro and the rest of southern Ontario were weakening and expected to end last night, but Hepburn cautioned that isolated thunderstorms could develop today and tomorrow.

Local farmers received some relief yesterday, as the storms brought 26 millimetres (1 inch) of rain to their parched properties.

A heavy rainstorm Friday, which officials say packed a tornado, caused about \$150,000 damage at Devil's Pulpit Golf Club and forced a shutdown until the beginning of the week.

Doug Ball, director of golf at the beautiful Caledon course, said the storm uprooted more than a dozen trees, including two 80-foot maples, and spread other minor damage to some sand traps and buildings.

"The fire marshal said he thinks tornadoes touched down in two places because of the way the trees were so twisted where they broke," Ball said. "It was scary. One minute we had sun and we were playing, the next minute it was all black."

Ball said 25 course staff members are spending the weekend repairing and removing the damage and will have the course ready to re-open tomorrow.
