THE PRELIMINARY YEAR

The Preliminary Year offered at Brescia College is designed for students who have completed Grade 12 (Ontario) or who have the equivalent standing. Minimum standards of admission as set by the College are based on percentage, or rank-in-class and on principal's reports.

Each case of an adult special student seeking admission to the Preliminary Year will be judged on its own merits by the Admission Committee of the College.

PROGRAMS

The General Program in Arts and Social Science, all Honors Programs which include English, History and Philosophy, and the first two years of Honors Business Administration are offered by Huron College. All laboratory courses in Science are taught in the College of Science.

30. Religious Studies: An introduction to the Living Religions of the World: A study of the history, faith, and practices of the major living religions. 2 hours

38. Religious Studies: Great Biblical Ideas in Relation to Contemporary Thought. 2 hours

44. Religious Studies: 20th Century Theological and Philosophical Problems: A seminar designed to exhibit clearly the rational basis for the radical transformation of theology in the 20th century. The literature of contemporary analysis will be examined as it bears on specific topics, e.g., The existence of God, Order and Design, Meaning and Morality, Religious Experience and Authority. The latter part of the course will be a critical scrutiny of some contemporary responses to the problems posed. 2 hours

The General Programs and some of the Honors Programs are available in Brescia College. All laboratory courses in the Natural Sciences are taught entirely in the College of Science.

HOME ECONOMICS

23. **Applied Art:** Fundamentals of design and colour. 2 hours—13
25. **Household Administration:** General principles of Home construction and planning, problems of home management and equipment. 2 hours—31
30. **Textiles:** Identification and testing of fiber fabrications and finishes; textile industry development; flat pattern techniques; analysis of construction methods. 1 lecture, 3 laboratory hours—13
31. **Normal Nutrition:** Normal requirements of the body; food nutrients and their functions; deficiencies. 2 lectures both terms, 2 laboratory hours 1 term—21
32. **Food Science:** Experimental approach to the study of factors influencing behavior of foods. 1 lecture, 3 laboratory hours—31
33. **Interior Decoration:** History of interior decoration with emphasis on furniture styles from ancient times to the present. 1 hour, half course—35
Prerequisite: Home Economics 23

40. Clothing and Designing: Interdisciplinary study of clothing and historic costume; clothing and tailoring methods. Design adaptations of historic costume in the study of flat pattern and draping techniques.

Prerequisite: Home Economics 30 2 lectures, 3 laboratory hours— 7

41. Advanced Nutrition: Nutritional needs during infancy; the adolescent. Diet therapy. Seminars. 3 hours—14

42. Principles of Food Science:

Prerequisite: Home Economics 32 1 lecture, 3 laboratory hours—19

45. Consumer Economics and Communications: Marketing and consumer problems. Demonstration techniques. 1 lecture, 2 laboratory hours—23

48. Institutional Food Production: The application of scientific principles to the preparation, selection and storage of quality food. Floor planning, layout and equipment. Laboratory exercises and field trips.

2 lectures, 3 laboratory hours—29

49. Institution Management: Principles of management; personnel supervision; financial control. Clinical studies. 3 hours—33

PHILOSOPHY

20x. Introduction to Philosophy: This course deals with fundamental problems in Philosophy, especially in Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy and Metaphysics, and the solutions offered by great thinkers in these respective fields. 3 hours— 1

35x. Aesthetics: A study of aesthetical theory of classic and modern points of view. 2hours— 3

48x. Contemporary Philosophy: A critical study of selected 20th century philosophers and movements. Emphasis on figures and schools varies from year to year according to students' needs and background. 2 hours—14

49x. Special Topics in Philosophy 2 hours— 8

Psychology 20 is ordinarily prerequisite to all other courses in Psychology.

20x. Introduction to Psychology: Problems and methods; individual differences and their assessment; learning; memory; thinking; sensation and perception; motivation; emotion; personality. 3 hours—19

31x. Theories of Personality: Representative theoretical interpretations of personality development and dynamics. 2 hours— 6

36x. Child Psychology: Ages, stages, and factors involved in the development to a mature personality; introduction to theory, research and problems in selected areas of child behavior, especially learning, maturation, and socialization. 2 hours—16

39x. Exceptional Children: Problems and methods in work with the gifted, mentally deficient, physically handicapped, brain damaged, and emotionally disturbed child. 2 hours—22

46x. Applied Psychology: The application of psychological principles to practical problems, with the major emphasis on problems in education and industry. 2 hours—27

48x. Abnormal Psychology: A consideration of abnormal activities in sensation, perception, memory, emotion, thought and behavior; mental deficiency; the causes and symptoms of psychoneuroses; some reference to major mental disorders; psychotherapeutic techniques.

40. Social Problems: Study of theories of deviant behavior and of social disorganization, with particular attention to certain specific problems of the contemporary period. 3 hours— 4

SOCIOLOGY

Requirements for Admission: Grade 13 standing (with an average of 60%) in four subjects comprising seven credits including English, a language other than English or Mathematics, Chemistry and at least one other subject (Biology recommended).

This program, which leads to the B.A. degree in Home Economics, is offered jointly by the University and Brescia College. Students on main campus will register in the Faculty of Social Science. All Home Economics courses are offered at Brescia College.

The Department of Education of Ontario accepts a degree in this program as the academic qualification for High School Assistant's Certificate, Type B, for teaching in the Elementary or Secondary Schools of Ontario.

Students may also take dietetic internship in institutions approved by The Canadian Dietetic Association for professional training.

COURSES

Arts and Social Science courses taught at King's College follow the same prescription as those taught at the University. For course descriptions please see the pertinent sections of this calendar. In addition the following courses are offered at King's College but not at the University.

Philosophy

- 45x. Political Philosophy:** Critical readings from selected original sources of the political thought of ancient, modern, and contemporary thinkers. 3 hours—5
- 47x. Modern Philosophy:** Readings in the works of selected philosophers from the Renaissance to the present day. 3 hours—35
- 49x. Philosophy of Education:** An inquiry into the classical and modern Philosophies of education. 2 hours—32

Psychology

- 40x. Dynamology:** Vegetative powers; sensation and perception; internal senses, feeling and emotion; reflex behavior; intellectual operations; the unconscious; abnormal phenomena; the faculty theory and modern psychological research. 3 hours—25

Religious Studies

21. Salvation History: The story of the Covenant people, from Abraham to the eve of the Christian era, followed by the history of the New Israel from pre- and early-Christian expectations, up to the end of the 1st century A.D. The approach combines history, literary analysis, archaeology, and biblical theology.

3 hours—18

32. Contemporary Moral Problems: A critical examination of contemporary moral attitudes and standards. An attempt to present a Christian approach to some recent moral issues, such as sex, drugs, mass-media, money, politics, war, segregation, etc.

2 hours—26

35. Comparative Christian Religions: A study of the theological issues at stake in the division of Christendom; approaches to Christian unity; Ecumenism.

2 hours—26

40. The Theology of Marriage: A study of marriage considered from the psychological, moral, social, and theological points of view.

2 hours—28

42. Christian Social Theory: The modern and contemporary teachings of the Christian church on social justice, wages, property, work, poverty, social reconstruction, etc. The course will examine the thought of leading theorists and its application to contemporary society.

3 hours—18
